Often, our answers reference our social roles as lawyers, citizens, or parents. But consider a would-be whistleblower, a wife challenging the gendered division of household labor, or the conflicted police officer Javert from <i>Les Misérables</i>. These agents feel there is a conflict between morality and the norms of their role. I argue that these are genuine normative conflicts. While many have attempted to explain role normativity in purely moral terms, I argue that social roles have distinctive value that can create good reasons to act immorally. Roles can also generate a form of exculpation that has been neglected by standard accounts of moral responsibility.
